The Basics of Teacher Training

The initiative focuses on building long-term, sustainable surgical capacity by empowering the next generation of trainers, not only with strong skills teaching techniques, but also with the art of storytelling to communicate knowledge effectively, creatively, and with inspiration.

Led through a long-standing partnership between Haydom Lutheran Hospital, Global Surgery Amsterdam, Dokters van de Wereld Nederland, and Amsterdam UMC, along with support from Pharos Foundation, participants were made ready to provide the Open Fractures course, Burn Care course, and Basics of Anesthesia course. The course ended with inspiring words from Haydom Lutheran Hospital Executive Director Dr. Paschal Mdoe and Director of Clinical Services Vicky Daudi.

Dr. Mdoe reminded us of Mandela's message: "Education is the most powerful weapon which you can use to change the world." Proud to see such growth, creativity, and commitment to strengthening surgical training at HLH.

Endocrine Surgery Course for Surgical Residents

From 20–31 October 2025, an Endocrine Surgery course for Liberian surgical residents was delivered at JFK University Hospital (Monrovia) and Phebe Hospital (Bong County). This was a joint initiative of NVvH Global, the IAES–INTEREST programme, CapaCare, the surgical teams at JFK and Phebe, and the Liberia College of Physicians and Surgeons (LCPS).

The program consisted of both theoretical knowledge-gaining as well as hands-on training with lectures, discussions, patient selection, and supervised thyroid surgery.

This outreach aligns closely with the aims of the NVvH Global modular training

programme and the IAES–INTEREST educational model, and underscores a shared commitment to strengthening surgical training capacity in Liberia. Most importantly, it was highly appreciated and applauded by the residents in training for surgery in Liberia.

A pilot study on the acceptability and safety of collaborative triage and treatment with traditional bonesetters for extremity fracture patients: a stepped-wedge, cluster-randomised controlled trial in rural Tanzania

Introduction

Fracture patients in resource-limited settings frequently attend traditional bonesetters (TBSs), often resulting in non/malunion or infectious complications. Intersectoral collaboration between formal healthcare and TBSs has the potential to make this practice safer but has never been tested previously. This pilot study assesses the acceptability and safety of collaborative fracture management (CFM).

Methods

Within a pilot stepped-wedge cluster-randomised controlled trial, we included three TBSs (clusters) and their extremity fracture patients from Rorya district, Tanzania. We randomly assigned TBS timepoints to transition from standard TBS care (control) to CFM (intervention). CFM consisted of X-ray imaging, analgesia and guideline-based discussion between a doctor and TBS to guide definitive fracture management. Patient follow-up was at 1, 3 and 6 months postinclusion. In an intention-to-treat analysis, we estimated average treatment effects through ordinary least squares and Poisson regression for primary outcomes of protocol adherence, patient satisfaction and number of complications. The trial is registered at the Pan-African Clinical Trial Registry (PACTR202307910320431) and is completed.

Results

Between 28 August 2023 and 28 April 2024, we included 21 intervention (9 females, 12 males) and 31 control patients (11 females, 20 males). Protocol adherence was 66.7% in the intervention group, with prohibitive cost and fear of surgery being the most common reasons for non-adherence. Mean satisfaction, quality of life and disability did not differ statistically between groups. Intervention patients had 0.072 less complications than control patients (95% CI -0.11 to -0.031, $p=0.001$), corresponding with a number-needed-to-treat of 13.9 patients to prevent one complication.

Conclusions

Our results suggest CFM is acceptable and safe to patients and TBSs, offering a model to improve fracture care in resource-limited settings worldwide. To improve the model's

efficacy, additional strategies are necessary to overcome socioeconomical and educational barriers to surgery. Future research could investigate the generalisability of our findings in other settings.

Basics of Open Fractures Course in Shirati and Bunda

Building on the ongoing collaboration described above, the Basics of Open Fractures Course was delivered at Shirati KMT Hospital (3rd edition) and in Bunda District Hospital (1st edition).

Over three days, traditional bonesetters and healthcare workers trained side by side in core trauma skills, including fracture management, splinting techniques, X-ray interpretation, and wound care. To date, a total of 91 healthcare workers and 21 traditional bonesetters have been trained through this programme.

Malawi Surgical Oncology Summer School 4th edition

This week, the fourth Malawi Surgical Oncology Summer School has started, training the next generation of Malawian surgeons and gynaecologists in the fundamentals of surgical oncology. For the first time, clinical officers were also participating, helping to build a stronger national network for consultation and referral. The programme reflects a strong collaboration across institutions and borders, supporting sustainable improvements in surgical cancer care.





Surgical Oncology module in Liberia

At JFK Hospital in Monrovia, the NVvH collaborated with Liberian surgeons and CapaCare through a focused Surgical Oncology module, together with Marije Gourdinou de Gouberville and Tom Gresnigt.

With nearly all Liberian surgical residents participating (two were on rural rotation), the module offered an in-depth introduction to key principles of surgical oncology. The aim is clear: to strengthen local expertise and inspire the next generation of Liberian surgeons to further develop this emerging subspecialty.
